Rules of golf

Here are a couple of rule reminders for

Men's Club play:

1. One very simple rule that is often ignored on that "easy" tap-in: Putt all balls into the hole. All balls during official Men's Club play must be holed for score. While this may take a few extra seconds, I think we all have to admit that, on occasion, we have all missed a two-foot putt. One possible exception to this rule is if the player has reached the maximum score for them on the hole. In that case they may pick up their ball and record the maximum allowable score unless this happens during tournament play when the total score must be recorded.

2. Preferred lies — Generally, when power carts are restricted to paths only, preferred lies are in effect. This is now allowed in the general areas of the course (i.e. includes fairway and the rough and doesn't include penalty areas). This rule allows for lifting and cleaning the ball, and then placing it within one club length (not a putter) of the original position, no closer to the hole than the original position.
